


President's Message

Wilmington Greenberg Show Report by Daniel F. Pawling, Jr.





The layout was a rectangle with two end loops spurs (see layout plan). The club Member's that showed their last names are listed on the modules in the plan. The trains are the core of the show and what people pay to see.

The locomotive is a full scale replica of the GWR Achilles class 4-2-2 locomotive No. 3041. It was built in 1894 and originally named "Emlyn" after Lord Emlyn, Chairman of the Great Western Railway Company. Repainted in 1897 in GWR livery, the great locomotive, 57 feet long was renamed "The Queen" especially to pull the six new carriages of the Royal Train. No examples of these locomotives survive today and "The Queen" (later renamed "James Mason") was withdrawn from service in 1912. The picture was taken at Windsor Royal Statiion in England.

The highlight of the show for me was, to see a module set reappear that I have not seen at a show for a while. This module is the Auto Train Module that was originally built by Ernie Poole. (More about the module in the June issue.) It is an award winning module. This module is great example to observe the high quality standard and interest in prototypical building of many of our NE Ntrak predecessors. The proud new owner of this 12' module with no mountain is Nancy & Gary Keil of Northeast Ntrak.

This is also good example of how we can recycle what is collecting dust in the basement and is not likely to make it to another show. This helps fills a gap that has been difficult to fill in getting more people showing & developing the enthusiasm for doing so. We don't have enough experienced module builders that want to help keep up with the need & demand for new modules that people have told me they want to build. If you have or know of any modules that don't get to shows any more, I would be willing to see if we can put you together with someone in need.

Some observations about the set up of this show:

We need to work on getting the set up complete on time (before the show opens for the public). We have been late for the last two or three shows. Setting up represents a lot of work in a small space of time and everyone at the show needs aware of this. This is not the time to stand around with your hands in the pockets or chat about things not directly related to setting up. If you're done with your modules you need to help with the other tasks that help to get the first test trains running so we can fix problems before the show opens. If you have come to help it is important that if you don't know what to do next, observe, participate, ask questions, to learn the process or shadow & help some one so you can learn a new skill for the next time. I will provide a list of tasks for set up & take down in a chronological list to help understand the process for the next show. This will be for new members and old as it is always good to brush up on our skills.
